HVCC PROJECT UPDATES

- The Town of Yucca Valley has withdrawn its request to extend its Sphere of Influence over the Homestead Valley Community of Yucca Mesa.
- The designation of Highway 247 as a Scenic Highway is now in the hands of County officials to present to CalTrans.
- A CalAware Workshop for both the public and government officials for education in the laws concerning open government is in the planning stages for sometime early next year.
- The problem with getting a permit if you rely on hauled water is Now being vigorously pursued with the County board of supervisors, in Tandem with the Lucerne valley Economic Development Association.
